

NICEVILLE — A group of volunteer firefighters spent their weekend suiting up and honing their skills, from dousing flames to prying open wrecked cars.

DESTIN - From Shark Saturdays to the Grouper Grab to the Snapper Snag, the 62nd annual Destin Fishing Rodeo is ready to go.
